### FPA FINE ARTS COMPETITION MAKES A STRONG COMEBACK AT THE GALERIA

One of Friends of Polish Art biggest achievements this year was bringing back the FPA Fine Arts Competition, formally known as "the Kubinski Fine Arts Competition", after a ten-year-long break. It was possible thanks to a seamless and fruitful partnership with the Polish Institute of Culture & Research at Orchard Lake (PICROL) for which FPA is deeply grateful.

Twenty-one talented Metropolitan Detroit artists representing different generations participated in the 29th Friends of Polish Art Fine Arts Competition, showing 74 striking and diverse art pieces, among them oil and acrylic paintings, drawings, watercolors, small sculptures and objects, digital photographs and prints, embroidery, head scarfs and costumes. The juror of the Competition, which took place at the OLS Galeria, was the designer/sculptor Martin Skalski. The post-competition exhibit ran for six weeks and was framed by a festive opening reception on October 5th, during which the awards were announced, and a more intimate closing reception on November 16th, with talks by the artists as its highlight. ### Dear FPA Members,

Friends of Polish Art had a very productive autumn season. FPA was able to bring back **the Fine Arts Competition** (in collaboration with the Polish Institute of Culture & Research), conducted **the Literary Competitions** (for youth and adults) as well as partnered with the Polish Art Center in organizing **the Annual Szopka Competition**. (More about the Fine Arts and Literary Competitions in this newsletter.) Like the other competitions, the Annual Szopka Competition attracted an impressive number of entries. The awards ceremony for the best szopka took place at the Polish Art Center in Hamtramck on December 7th. Encouraged by high participation and positive feedback, FPA plans to organize and host these competitions again in 2026.

With the arrival of winter, we are pleased to host our Annual Wigilia. This event offers a festive holiday atmosphere and features many Polish Christmas traditions. Attendees will have the opportunity to share oplatek, enjoy a traditional meatless Christmas Eve dinner, view a Szopki display, and watch a 2025 FPA events photo presentation. The evening will also include a performance by the Wawel Song & Dance Ensemble, kolędy and English Christmas carol singing, and raffles. We hope you will join us for this special occasion.

Shortly after the new year commences, we will announce our scholarship and folk-dance grant programs and conduct our annual elections. Since 2005, we have been privileged to annually provide five Frank Filipek scholarships to students pursuing disciplines such as medicine, law, architecture, science, engineering, and the liberal arts. We are very grateful to the Filipek family for their generosity. Over the past two decades, approximately 100 students have benefited from awards ranging between \$1,500 and \$2,500 through the Filipek Scholarship program. Regrettably, these funds have been exhausted. To continue with the scholarship program, the FPA Board has approved the introduction of three scholarships of \$2,000 each from the Mitchell Scholarship fund, which will support studies in the fields previously covered by the Frank Filipek scholarship. This new initiative will be named the Mitchell Scholarship Program.

Our annual elections will take place at the end of January. We are currently accepting nominations for all officers and five director positions, as well as for the role of Nominating Committee Chair. Members are encouraged to nominate themselves or others to any position. Until we find a committee chair, please contact me if you can help the organization by serving as a member of the board.

It is also time to arrange payment of your annual dues for 2026. In addition to check payments, you may utilize the "payment button" on our website; please note that this method incurs a small service fee. If you choose to pay via PayPal or Venmo through the payment button, we kindly ask that you cover the additional service charge. If you pay your dues through electronic means, please contact Carol Surma, Financial Secretary, to update your contact information.

On display at the Galeria during the exhibit was a glass case filled with memorabilia from previous FPA competitions, including old programs and photos of the winners as well as small watercolors created by Richard Kubinski himself.

The FPA Kubinski Fine Arts Competition began in 1980. Over the years the competition, which was first intended only for artists of Polish descent, has evolved and now allows all artists in the community to participate. Many art pieces entered into the competition this year reflected broadly understood Polish themes and cultural values: strong evidence that the organizers achieved their goal of promoting Polish culture and heritage. Also carrying on the competition's legacy were two main awards, one given for the "Best Polish Theme" and one named after Richard Kubinski ("Best in Show - FPA Richard Kubiński Award"). In addition, other FPA awards commemorated a few deceased members of FPA, known for their dedicated work for the organization and for Polonia.

Big thanks to our partner, the Polish Institute of Culture & Research at Orchard Lake, to all the artists, and to juror Martin Skalski for making the competition, the opening and the closing so remarkable.

### FPA LITERARY COMPETITIONS RETURN AND DAZZLE

FPA is very pleased that in 2025 many more entries than in the previous year were submitted to the FPA Literary Competitions, in both the youth and the adult categories.

A lot of credit for this success goes to **Pamela Saunders**, chair of the FPA Literary Competitions Committee, who supervised and promoted the competitions, which only a year ago were revived after a lengthy pause. Encouraged by this year's success, Friends of Polish Art is planning to continue the literary competitions.

The award ceremony, celebrating the writers and the art of storytelling took place on October 25th at the OLS Galeria. During the ceremony, the attendees thoroughly enjoyed six of the authors readings excerpts from their works.

This year the theme of the **Suzanne Marie Margaret Sloat - Youth Literary Competition** was "My adventures with a famous person of Polish descent or Polish legend or mythological creature", while adult writers, submitting their entries to the **Estelle Wachtel-Torres, MD Literary Competition** were asked to write historical fiction based on the life and accomplishments of one of the 2025 Patrons of Poland, chosen by the Polish Parliament.

The submissions to the competitions were judged on their creativity, treatment of a theme, style, also on how accurately they represented the historical contexts, as well as on grammatical correctness. The jurors - in alphabetical order – Alina Klin, Brian Malski, Mark Ozog, Jessica Saunders, and Pam Saunders very much enjoyed the creative storytelling and were impressed with the imaginative ways the works explored our rich Polish culture.

The first prize, and \$500 award in the adult competition went to **Sasha Gilders**, a Notre Dame student, for her cycle of poems The Metronome of Warsaw. The cycle traces the life of the poet, playwright and journalist, Antoni Słonimski, raised Catholic in an assimilated Jewish family from Warsaw, and captures his struggles with questions of identity, exile, censorship, and artistic freedom across a turbulent century. For her reading Sasha chose two poems from the beginning of the cycle, addressing the Polish-Jewish upbringing of the future poet and one from the end, describing life in Poland under Stalinism. During the reception that followed the ceremony, the very talented young author revealed that she has been working on a crime novel and has already written four chapters. Quite an achievement, indeed!
